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Honors Program Introduction & Overview



The CRC Honors Program offers an empowering academic community centered on special-topics General Education (IGETC) classes, special events, counseling, and advising, providing enhanced transfer and scholarship opportunities, a foundation for success in graduate or professional school, and a pathway to professional life.

CRC Honors helps you get where you want to go!

CRC Honors Program student completion rates are:

- 710% higher than those of CRC students as a whole.
- 44% higher than the completion rates of CRC Honors-eligible, but non-Honors students.



But CRC Honors students don't merely transfer successfully,

they transfer preferentially to highly selective institutions.

Our students have recently transferred to, among other prestigious institutions,

UCLA, UC Berkeley, UC Davis, Spelman College, and Stanford University.

CRC is a member of the UCLA Transfer Alliance Program (TAP), which offers Honors students a

priority admissions pathway to the UCLA College of Letters & Science



--an over 300% increase in your likelihood of being accepted for transfer to UCLA.

Honors also provides special access to scholarships.

For example:

The UCLA TAP Scholarship

provides approximately

\$5,000 per year

for up to two years.

Only students who earn a certification from a TAP-participating community college honors program (like CRC's) are eligible.



UC Davis Regents Scholarship

one of the most prestigious undergraduate scholarships in the UC system, has been awarded to a CRC Honors transfer student for the past two years in a row (2021 and 2022 admissions cycles).

Regents scholars at UC Davis receive \$7,500 in addition to a stipend based on financial need,

and are offered admission to the highly selective UCD University Honors Program.

Honors seminars are capped at only 15 students!



In an ordinary college lecture course, the instructor is exclusively responsible for the selection and delivery of course content.



In a seminar course, the students are, collectively, as responsible as the instructor for the selection and delivery of course content.



So, in a seminar you're active, rather than passive, and you get to study what interests **you**.

Honors courses supports you in pursuing your own particular academic interests in a way other courses can't.



Honors provides more than just an enriched classroom environment.



Honors students enjoy a rich array of opportunities for academic engagement beyond the classroom.

For example, CRC Honors students act as session chairs and commentators at the annual

CRC-CSUS CPPE Fall Ethics Symposium (a regional academic event that draws

up to1,000 participants), alongside nationally renowned scholars.



Honors students enjoy enhanced opportunities for selfdirected study, including the opportunity to pursue their own original research.






Student eligibility for Honors crc.losrios.edu/honors/apply

PATHWAY ONE

Students who have completed at least 12 transfer-level college units

are eligible if they have a minimum

3.0 GPA and are

eligible for, or have successfully completed, ENGWR 300.

PATHWAY TWO

Students who have completed less than 12 transfer-level college units are eligible if they have a minimum 3.0 high school GPA and at least one of the following:

a grade of B or better in APpreparatory Honors English

a grade of B or better in AP or IB English

a score of 4 or 5 on the AP English Language and Composition Exam.

PATHWAY THREE: CHALLENGE PATHWAY

Any student is eligible for the Honors Program if they submit a successful Honors Program Challenge Application, demonstrating to the satisfaction of the Honors Admissions Committee their interest, motivation, preparation and potential for Honors Program study.

PATHWAY THREE: CHALLENGE PATHWAY

General Admission

Take any Honors courses you like!

Students granted general (aka unrestricted) admission may take any Honors courses they choose—so long as they satisfy any relevant course-level prerequisites. (Most Honors courses do not have course-level prerequisites.)

Students granted general admission are encouraged (but not required) to complete the 15-unit Honors Scholar Program.

Restricted Admission

Take a course or two!

Restricted admission consists in special permission to take a specific Honors course (or two).

Restricted admits still enjoy all the co-curricular and support services the Honors Program provides while they are taking Honors classes.

Students who assess into Honors College Composition (ENGWR 480/HONOR 375) and/or Honors Statistics (STAT 480/HONOR 393) are <u>guaranteed</u> restricted admission to the course(s) they've assessed into.

PATHWAY THREE: Restricted Admission

Addresses Uncertainty

Allows students who are unsure to try Honors out

Allows Honors to give an applicant whose potential is unclear from their application the benefit of the doubt

Accommodates Limited Interest

Allows students who are only interested in one or two Honors courses to communicate their intentions to the program.

Allows admissions for students who are strong in one academic area, but not in others to have a targeted experience with Honors.

Provides a stepping stone

Restricted admits who do well (earn a course grade of "B" or better) in one Honors course are encouraged to apply for general admission.
